




IVORY COAST

52,637 Cocoa Horizons registered farmers
(48,795 men, 3,442 women) across 628 villages




TRACEABILITY

- 43,803 MT Cocoa Horizons beans traced back to source
- 70% of volume traced digitally (remainder traced via paper trail)



PRODUCTIVITY


- 24,666 farmers trained in GAP
- 48 Farmer Group Managers, 46 Group Administrators, and 144 Farmer Trainers received extensive “Training of Trainers” on Productivity topics
- 831 Group Trainings covering 4 modules took place with 67% of farmers
- 16,262 farmers were mapped



COMMUNITY




- 1 Assistant Branch Manager, 2 Group Administrators, and 18 Farmer Trainers received extensive training on implementing a Child Labor Monitoring and Remediation System (CLMRS)
- 468 farmers covered by CLMRS, monitoring 667 children
- 1 school extension constructed, including 3 classrooms, 3 latrines, furniture and solar energy
- 25 communities received school kits, benefiting 2,850 students
- 6 women have participated in extensive agroforestry training and farm plot development; 54 are targeted for remainder of year
- 991 farmers trained in health modules





GHANA

28,386 Cocoa Horizons registered farmers (19,038 men and 9,348 women) across 1,040 villages in Ghana

TRACEABILITY

- 675 purchasing clerks and 36 district officers trained on traceability systems
- 18,273 MT of Cocoa Horizons beans traced back to source

PRODUCTIVITY

- 10,250 farmers trained in GAP
- All new farmers will undergo training in the second half of the year
- 2 Assistant Branch Managers, 29 Field Agents and 10 Farmer Trainers received extensive week-long “Training of Trainers” covering topics including: situational analysis, pruning, nursery management and transplanting
- Productivity Package pilot program launched with 116 farmers receiving access to credit, inputs (i.e. pruning equipment) and coaching



BANK



- 8 savings accounts opened via Opportunity International, each account benefiting a “solidarity group” of 15 farmers
- 2,647 farmers identified to need 2,138,735 seedlings for rehabilitation
- Together with partnership of the Cocoa Health and Extension Division of the Ghana Cocoa Board, the distribution of seedlings is planned for June 2017
- Demonstration plots established: 16
- 240 farmers mapped in 3 communities

COMMUNITY

- 98.5% of previously registered farmers trained in child labor prevention
- In conjunction with the International Cocoa Initiative (ICI) a pilot Child Labor Monitoring and Remediation System will commence in the second half of the year


TANZANIA - SPECIAL PROJECT

1,500 Cocoa Horizons registered farmers across 15 villages



PRODUCTIVITY

- 4 nurseries established producing 140 hectares worth of planting material
- 90% of the nursery workers are women
- 140,000 seedlings distributed
- 15 demonstration plots developed



COMMUNITY

- 65 classrooms constructed
- 1,000 desks delivered
- 52 toilet stalls constructed
- 6 teachers' offices built
- 100% of farmers and 90 village coordinators received training on health issues
